MESSAGE FROM THE TOWN SUPERVISOR

2025 Significant Milestones and 2026 Upcoming Initiatives

Last year 2025 marked a period of transformation and accomplishment. We would like to spotlight some key milestones from the past year and outline a few key initiatives for the upcoming year.

2025 Highlights

- The Town tax rate has been reduced once again to **\$4.45 per \$1,000 for 2026**, marking the third consecutive year of rate cuts. *More on page 2.*
- We have successfully finalized the **20-Year Comprehensive Master Plan**. This long-term strategy, shaped by local government and community contributions, will steer future growth, development, and land use within our municipality. A heartfelt thank you to everyone who played a part in this process.
- The recreation program reached record participation levels in 2025, culminating in the return of the Parade of Lights event. This celebration delighted the community, and we are thrilled to see its return.
- Our Senior Center has received much-needed updates, including new flooring, tables, and chairs, partially funded through federal resources.
- Significant progress has been made on a potential water district. The project has advanced to the Engineering and Planning phase, with a detailed update to be shared in Q2/2026. *More on page 2.*
- We welcomed three new additions this year: Ann Buck, Assessor; Cindy Pfeifer, Budget Officer; and Mark Boylan, Town Attorney. Each brings a wealth of experience to their respective role.



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2026 Initiatives

- We plan to upgrade our financial software system to a more effective and efficient solution. The current system is outdated and lacks necessary support.
- A new website will be launched this year, and we are in the process of selecting a new web services provider. More details to follow in upcoming months.
- We are working on replacing our Geographic Information System (GIS), which captures, stores, analyzes, and displays geographically referenced data. This system is essential for the operations of our Building Department and Assessor's office, and could also benefit our Highway Department.
- Plans for a comprehensive town-wide revaluation are in progress. As part of this initiative, the Assessor's office is currently examining the existing inventory for any inaccuracies or omissions. We intend to share more information on this subject in our upcoming Fall newsletter.
- Our recreation and senior programs are flourishing. We are committed to exploring new and exciting opportunities while enhancing our existing offerings for all. We will continue to leverage our ARPA funds allocated by Monroe County to lower costs on youth and senior programs.

2025 FINANCIAL REVIEW

- The final operating statement for 2025 revealed a budget surplus for the 2025 fiscal year.
- We successfully managed to keep our expenses in check while surpassing our revenue projections for 2025.
- Capital Reserves were utilized effectively. This allows us to improve budgeting and helped to further reduce your Town tax rate for 2026.
- All local, county and state financial reporting was completed on time.
- We start 2026 in a strong financial position.

2025 END OF YEAR FUND BALANCES

The Town Fund balances are robust compared to historical averages. Maintaining a solid balance sheet is crucial for our Town for several reasons:

- It supports our Town's credit rating.
- It ensures compliance with New York State audit requirements.

It provides a buffer for any unforeseen expenses that may occur.

2026 INITIATIVES

- Prioritize the preservation and enhancement of affordability in Wheatland.
- Explore infrastructure programs designed to improve the quality of life for all residents.
- Increase government efficiency and strengthen communication between the government and the community, ensuring focus on the most important programs.
- Enhance communication with both the Village government and the School District administrations.

WATER DISTRICT UPDATE

October 2025

An informational meeting was held regarding the Proposed Water District, where community members were presented with the findings from the feasibility analysis conducted at that time. The data shared during the feasibility analysis meeting indicates costs well below the NYS Comptroller's threshold per Equivalent Dwelling Unit (EDU).

- The estimated costs depend on receiving qualifying grants.
- These costs include both water usage fees and bond repayments.
- Only residents within the proposed district will be responsible for these expenses.

January 2026

The Town Board approved proceeding with the Engineering and Planning phase for the proposed district, which is anticipated to be completed by May 2026.

Next Steps: involve establishing the district and submitting grant applications, which are currently planned for Summer 2026. For more information, please visit the Town website under 'Water District News.'

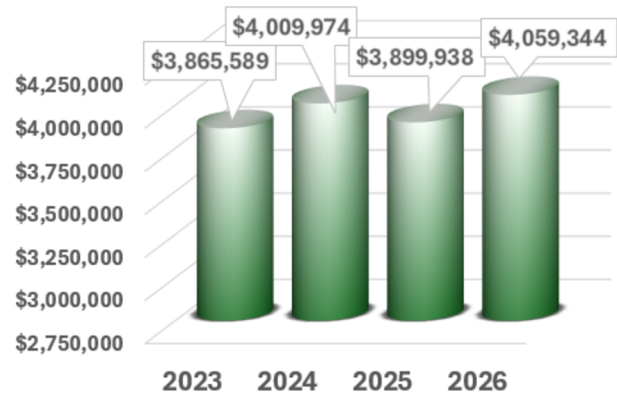
2026 TOWN BUDGET & TAX RATE

The total Town budget for 2026 experienced a modest increase. Over the last 3 years, the budget is up approximately 1.67% on an annualized basis, well below the rate of inflation.

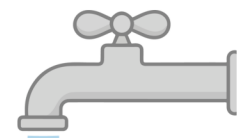
- The increases mainly encompass personnel costs, healthcare costs, and contractual services.
- There are also one-time budget allocations for upgrading our financial software and addressing needed office infrastructure improvements and requirements.

The Townwide tax rate for 2026 has experienced another decrease. Since 2023, Wheatland's overall tax rate has dropped by approximately 30%. We are dedicated to meticulously examining every tax dollar, aiming to further lessen the tax burden for the residents of the Town of Wheatland.



BUILDING DEPARTMENT

As warmer weather approaches and we transition to swimming pool season we want to remind pool owners of the importance of child safety around swimming pools. New swimming pool installations require a building permit. Residents should be aware that there was a recall on certain above ground pools in 2025, more info can be found at cpsc.gov. Listed below is some information on swimming pool safety:

- **4 feet, 4 sides** - The pool fence should be at least 4 feet high and completely surround the pool, separating it from the house and the rest of the yard.
- **Climb-proof** - The fence shouldn't have any footholds, handholds, or objects such as lawn furniture or play equipment the child could use to climb over the fence. Chain-link fences are very easy to climb and are not recommended as pool fences. (If they are used, make sure openings are 1¾ inches or smaller in size).
- **Slat space** - To ensure a small child can't squeeze through the fence, make sure vertical slats have no more than 4 inches of space between them. This will also help keep small pets safe, too.
- **Latch height** - The fence should have a self-closing and self-latching gate that only opens out, away from the pool area. The latch should be out of a child's reach—at least 54 inches from the ground.
- **Gate locked, toy-free** - When the pool is not in use, make sure the gate is locked. Keep toys out of the pool area when it is not in use.
- **Life jackets** - Put your child in a properly fitted US Coast Guard approved life jacket when around or near open water.
- **CPR training** - Parents, caregivers, and pool owners should know CPR and how to get emergency help.
- **Pool alarms** - Children can drown within seconds, with barely a splash. Swimming pool alarms can detect waves on the water's surface and sound off to attract attention when someone has fallen into the pool. Consider alarms on the pool fence gate, house doors and windows. Door and gate alarms can be equipped with touch pads to let adults pass through without setting them off. House doors should be locked if a child could get to the pool through them.

HIGHWAY

Winter Recap

This winter season has been exceptionally busy for the Highway Department. While our salt usage remained consistent with last year, the team completed an impressive 200 more plow runs compared to the previous season. This notable increase in activity was largely due to the persistent high winds and drifting snow that impacted our area throughout the winter months. Such challenging weather conditions necessitated continuous vigilance from the Highway Department to ensure that our roads remained safe and navigable. It has undoubtedly been a long and demanding season, and the dedication of the Highway Department in keeping our roads clear and secure has been truly commendable.

Upcoming Road Work

As we move into warmer weather, the Highway Department will shift its focus toward enhancing and maintaining various local roads. Current plans include extensive work on Armstrong Rd., Lime Rock Rd., and Rolling Acres. Additionally, we will conduct preparation and spot repairs on McGinnis Road.

Furthermore, the Highway Department will partner with Monroe County on several significant initiatives, including improvements on Twin Bridge Rd., State St., and Winslow Rd. These collaborative efforts are essential for ensuring smooth travel throughout the Town.

We also plan to assist neighboring Towns with their road work, which includes:

- Riga: Bridgeman Road, Hosmer Road, and Robertson Road
- Rush: Five Points Road, Honeoye Falls Number 6 Road, and Rush West Rush Road

This vital work will not only help out our neighbors, but also produce revenue for the Highway Department.

We appreciate your patience and understanding as we embark on these important projects. Your cooperation is invaluable and we are committed to minimizing any inconvenience while executing these necessary improvements.

SMITH-WARREN AMERICAN LEGION POST # 367 HISTORY

A meeting of Scottsville WWI veterans was held in 1919, in the yard of what is now known as Hansford's, also referenced as Col. Cary Brown's, on East Genesee Street. Army veteran Robert J. Murphy was the driving force behind the formation of Smith Warren Post #367. He was also the first Commander of the Post. The Post was granted a charter on September 8th, 1919, by the Department of New York. The Charter members of Smith-Warren Post 367 were: John Clydesdale, Joseph Tyler, Roger Clydesdale, George Jarret, Joseph Piaty, Stewart Warren, Robert Murphy, Mike Tony, Albert Ackerman, Howard Willis, William Osmon, Arthur Trigg, John Kalaher, Orrie Nelan, and Fred Clark. The last WWI member of the post, Curtice Booth, died in 1989.

The Post was named after Warren N. Smith and his cousin William J. Warren. Warren and Smith were members of the 78th Division, 310th Infantry. Warren N. Smith was a private in Co. K. He enlisted on April 4, 1918. He was killed in action on September 21, 1918, by artillery fire while returning from a volunteer mission to the rear to get more ammunition. He was returned and buried in the Oatka Cemetery in Scottsville.

William J. Warren was a private in Co. C of the 78th Division, 310th Infantry. He enlisted on February 2, 1918, and died of pneumonia on February 17, 1919. He is buried in the American Military Cemetery, Saint Mihiel Thieu-Court, France.

After receiving the Charter, meetings occurred in Windom Hall (now the Scottsville Library), various homes, and the old Fire House (now Town Hall). The Post then began meeting in the basement of the old Oatka Hotel, previously owned by Mr. Woodard.

On December 14, 1937, the current Post Home at 61 Main Street was purchased for \$1,200 and \$75.00 for the furnishings. This property was the Bethel Chapel. The Post was Incorporated as well. Dr. Clarence Pearson held the mortgage & the Commander was John Leonard Sr. An addition was built on the back in 1954, and the large meeting hall was built in 1977. A handicap ramp and entrance restrooms were added in 1992.

This year, the Smith-Warren American Legion Post #367 is uniting our Memorial Day event with the United States' 250th Anniversary celebration. By joining these two milestones, we will host a landmark community event that honors our fallen heroes while celebrating 250 years of American liberty. DOG CONTROL

Dog licensing reminder!

All dogs 4 months of age and older must be licensed and have a current rabies vaccination. Licenses are available through the Town Clerk's office. Please remember to update your license if you move, rabies vaccine was renewed or passing of your pet.

What to do if ...

You find a stray dog: Call dog control with location and description. Secure the dog until an officer arrives.

Your dog is missing: Call Dog Control immediately. Licensed dogs with tags are often reunited the same day.

Spring Safety Tips!

Do not leave dogs unattended outdoors or in a vehicle for long periods, check fencing for winter damage, use reflective gear for evening walks, keep ID tags (license) current, and be mindful of increasing wildlife activity this time of year.

Save the date!

Our annual free rabies clinic is scheduled for September 12 at 9:00 am at the Scottsville Fire Department, 385 Scottsville Mumford Rd. Pets must be at least 12 weeks old to receive a vaccine. Please bring proof of last rabies vaccination, which will determine whether they receive a 1- or 3-year vaccination. All dogs must be leashed, and all other animals must be contained in a proper carrier. The clinic is first come first served, expect wait times and always keep pets under control.

FROM THE TOWN HISTORIAN WHEATLAND IN 1776

On July 4, 1776, the Declaration of Independence was officially adopted by the Continental Congress in Philadelphia. At that time Philadelphia was the largest city in the new United States. A few days later when the declaration was read aloud in public, the city erupted in celebration with bells ringing, bands playing, bonfires and parades.



In 1776, the area that is now the Town of Wheatland was a dense forest - no roads or bridges over the Oatka or the Genesee, no stores, schools or churches. There were narrow trails traveled by the Seneca Indians who lived in the area. They hunted in the woods and clearings and fished in Oatka Creek.

Soon after the Revolutionary War ended in 1784, people who had lived in New England and eastern New York began moving westward searching for more and better land. By the early 1800s farms had been established all over what is now Wheatland.

Several of the men who came with their families in those days had been soldiers in the Revolutionary War. They became important citizens here and are buried in our cemeteries.

The Town of Wheatland will celebrate the 250th Anniversary of our country on Memorial Day. Many events are being planned for the occasion. We will honor our heritage, the twenty Patriots who are buried here and our local veterans. Plan to spend the day with us to celebrate our country and learn about the Wheatland residents who helped win our freedom 250 years ago.



OUR CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION

This photograph of the Wheatland Centennial parade was taken on Main Street in Scottsville on September 13, 1889. The people of Wheatland were celebrating, in grand style, the one hundredth anniversary of the settlement of the town.

The appointed day dawned with perfect weather and a one-hundred-gun salute. A special excursion train brought the county dignitaries and the 54th Regiment Band from Rochester. Flags and banners festooned all the buildings in town. Large arches had been erected over the streets covered with evergreens, wildflowers, and symbols of the area's achievements. Local carpenter J. Talcott Wells built one of the arches in the style of his patented barn truss.

The parade was led by a Scottish bagpipe band. It was followed by the carriage carrying the speakers and the President of the Day, Oliver Allen II. The Mumford Cornet Band and the 54th Regiment Band provided additional music.

The parade ended at Brown's Grove on Rochester Street where a sumptuous dinner was served at noon. In the grove there was a platform for the program, one tent filled with exhibits of historical interest and another with a canvas covered dance floor. The ceremonies began with remarks by the President of the Day, band selections, and singing by a 50-voice choir. Speeches were given by local celebrities. Oliver McKenzie, in full Scottish dress, danced the Highland Fling to bagpipe music, the young people danced the night away, and a good time was had by all. A fireworks display capped off the evening. Estimated attendance was three to five thousand.

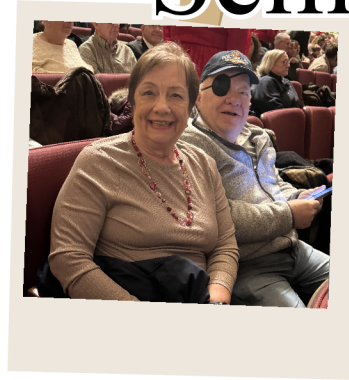

FREEMAN PARK UPDATE

In 2024, the Wheatland Town Board approved the formation of a Freeman Park Committee to address the rehabilitation of the Hamlet of Mumford's only public recreation area, Freeman Park. It had been nearly a quarter century since the park last underwent any major improvements. While its amenities remain functional and are frequently used, the park is in clear need of an update.

As one of the few dedicated open spaces in the Town of Wheatland, Freeman Park plays an important role in the community. The Town has a responsibility to maintain a safe, welcoming environment where children can play freely and families can gather in a secure, well-maintained setting.

Recognizing this need, the Town Board established a Parks Reserve Fund—essentially a dedicated savings account that can only be used for Town park improvements. The Board subsequently approved the use of these funds to develop a Master Plan for Freeman Park.

Prepared by an outside engineering firm, the Master Plan provides a comprehensive assessment of the park along with a long-term vision for its future. In addition to outlining a clear path forward, the plan strengthens the Town's ability to pursue grant funding opportunities.

One such opportunity is the NY Plays grant program, which supports the development and improvement of playgrounds across New York State. The Town's grant application will include a request for funding to replace the park's aging playground infrastructure. In preparation, the committee is currently reviewing proposals from multiple vendors to develop design concepts and generate cost estimates.

If awarded, the NY Plays grant will require matching taxpayer funds. A public hearing is being planned for May to review proposed playground concepts and associated costs for Freeman Park. The required matching funds and overall project scope will also be discussed at that time.

I LOVE MY PARKS DAY

As part of this year's event, we are excited to host a day with the Village of Scottsville, Genesee Valley Greenway State Park (GVGSP), Oatka Creek Watershed Committee (OCWC), and Friends of the Genesee Valley Greenway (FoGVG) which includes tree planting, trail and park clean-up and an Arbor Day celebration! Volunteer registration will open in early April, and we encourage residents, community groups and friends to sign up!

- Canawaugus Park / Indian Allan Park in Scottsville (Rte 251 at the Greenway Trailhead)
- Little Black Creek Park in Chili (between 84 Lumber and Byrne Dairy on Scottsville Road)
- Lehigh Valley Trailhead in Caledonia (between River Road and the river, near CP Ward)

Event Activities Include:

- Tree Planting from 8:30 AM–Noon, including a live demonstration led by a forester
- Trail side clean-up along various sections of the Greenway
- Arbor Day Celebration hosted by the Village of Scottsville Forestry Board (time to be announced later)
- The FoGVG will also supply snacks and water for the event.

BOARD OF ASSESSMENT REVIEW (BAR)

To clarify this often-confusing process, below are some critical dates and an overview of the process.

- Property owners who had a change to their assessment should receive notification around the first week in May, after the Tentative Assessment Roll is filed on or about May 1, 2026.
- Each year, property owners can challenge their assessments before the Board of Assessment Review (BAR), on Grievance Day.
- The Board of Assessment Review (BAR) is independent and reviews the evidence provided and decides if an assessment change is warranted.
- Property owners must file Form RP-524 (forms and instructions are on Town website) with the assessor or the BAR, by the Grievance Day, outlining the reason for the assessment challenge.
- Grievance Day is usually the fourth Tuesday in May. This year Grievance Day is May 26, 2026.
- Property owners will be informed of the outcome of their grievance hearing by mid-June.

WARREN CEMETERY

The Warren Cemetery, located on River Road between South Road and Quaker Road, is owned by the Town of Wheatland and serves as the final resting place of many of the community's earliest settlers. Among those interred are three veterans: Revolutionary War soldier Newman Warren, and War of 1812 veterans Benjamin Warren and Aaron Usher. The cemetery has been in a state of disrepair for several years. In this year's budget, funds have been designated to support its cleanup and restoration.

Plans include removing the dilapidated fence and replacing it with a split-rail fence, installing a new sign, and cleaning and repairing the gravestones. At present, the highway department has removed the old fence, and work is underway to prepare the site for the installation of the new split-rail fence and continued gravestone restoration.

Next time you are traveling along River Road, consider stopping to visit the cemetery and reflect on the lives of Wheatland's early settlers.
