MESSAGE FROM THE TOWN SUPERVISOR

While neighboring towns faced more severe damage, Wheatland also suffered, with numerous basements flooding and some structural damage occurring. It was a challenging time, and we collaborated with affected residents as needs arose. Since our last newsletter, our local government has seen some new faces. We are excited to welcome **Cindy Pfeifer** as our new Budget Officer and **Ann Buck** as our new Assessor. Additionally, we have promoted **Lindsey Ross** to the Dog Control Officer (DCO). All bring a wealth of experience to their vital roles: Cindy has worked with various local municipalities and school districts in a budgeting capacity, while Ann has dedicated 30 years to assessing properties in our area. Meanwhile, Lindsey spent the past 15 months as the Deputy DCO. I am thrilled to have all of them join the Town in their new roles.

Master Comprehensive Plan Update

After considerable effort, the Town is on track to adopt an updated Comprehensive Plan. This long-term blueprint, developed by local government, will guide future growth, development, and land use within our municipality. All aimed at fostering a cohesive and sustainable future for the town. I would like to thank everyone who participated in the process.

Townwide Water Survey

The Town has received multiple requests for water feasibility analyses through petitioning. As previously mentioned, the push for water services comes from the community, but it is the government's responsibility to address these petitions. 2025 YTD / 2026 Tentative Budget

Current 2025 Fiscal Status

As we navigate the 2026 Budget process, it is crucial to emphasize the Town's current fiscal condition. The chart below illustrates our Fund balances at the end of Q3 2025, along with our projections for those balances by the end of 2025.

It is noteworthy that our Tentative budget for 2026 is approximately **\$4.1 million**, as shown below. This indicates that we anticipate starting 2026 with a banking surplus of about **120%** of the tentative 2026 budget. The Town is in a very sound financial position as we enter 2026.

2025 Year-to-Date Performance (YTD)

As illustrated in the chart below, by the end of September 2025, we are on track to achieve a budget surplus. This indicates that our spending will be less than anticipated, and we are likely to generate more revenue than originally projected. We estimate concluding the year with an overall surplus of approximately **\$560,000**.

- **Expenses**: We consistently evaluate and manage expenses with great care. For 2025, we anticipate being under budget.
- **Revenues**: Our revenue projections are also set to exceed our expectations.

Special attention was directed towards enhancing our budgeting process in 2025. While 2024 experienced nearly a **11%** budget surplus, we are forecasting a **~7.5%** surplus for this year. It's crucial and responsible to continually assess performance and forecasting as part of our budgeting efforts.

The Budget process is the tool we use to generate your tax bill. As the Supervisor and Chief Financial Officer of the Town, it is my duty to work with the Budget Officer to provide the best forecasting model that we can. After all, it's your tax dollars!

Budgeting and Taxes

When creating the Budget, significant effort is dedicated to reducing the burden on taxpayers. We are now in the midst of the 2026 Budget cycle, and as outlined previously, we have a very strong balance sheet.

As can be seen in the chart below, we have taken the task of reducing your Town taxes very seriously. Again, in 2026, we are looking at a further reduction in the Townwide Tax rate.

Impact on Homeowner/Town Tax

For instance, a resident with a home valued at \$200,000 paid **\$1,212** in Town taxes in 2023. This year, that same resident paid **\$986** in Town taxes. This is a reduction of **about 19%**.

Building Department Announcements

Communication

The Building Department is introducing a new notification letter aimed at improving communication regarding expired building permits. This initiative is part of our ongoing effort to streamline processes, enhance transparency, and ensure compliance with local building regulations.

🔔 What's Changing?

Starting this month, property owners, contractors, and permit holders will receive a formal letter when a building permit has expired without final inspection or closure. The letter outlines:

- Permit details (including address, permit number, and scope of work)
- Expiration date and reason for expiration
- Next steps for reactivation, renewal, or closure
- Contact information for assistance

📌 Why This Matters

Expired permits can lead to complications during property sales, refinancing, or future construction. This new letter serves as a proactive reminder to help stakeholders resolve outstanding issues before they become costly or time-consuming.

✓ What You Can Do

If you receive an expired permit letter:

- Contact our office
- Schedule final inspections if work is complete
- Apply for permit renewal or extension if needed
- Submit documentation to close the permit if applicable

BUDGET OFFICE

I have 20 plus years experience working as a School District Treasurer, beginning at Avon CSD and then retiring from Honeoye Falls-Lima CSD in 2021. Since retiring, I have served as Interim Treasurer at Pittsford CSD and trained Treasurers at other school districts. I also work part-time as Clerk Treasurer at the Village of Livonia. I have worked extensively with municipal and school budgets during my career. I am currently in the office a couple of mornings per week and can be available as needed.

ASSESSOR

The Town of Wheatland is pleased to announce the appointment of **Ann Buck** as the Town Assessor. Ann brings a wealth of experience in property assessment. Ann served as the Town of Penfield Assessor for sixteen years and a number of years before that as an assessor in the southern tier region of the state of New York. The Assessor's office is committed to serving the community, and we encourage you to contact her office to set up an appointment regarding any concerns you may have.

TOWN CLERK

There are a wide range of services that are available at the Wheatland Town Office. The Town Clerk is a license issuing officer for New York State and applicants can apply for a marriage license, handicapped parking permit, and dog license. The Town Office also issues New York State Sporting Licenses to both residents and non-residents. The Town Clerk is custodian of all Town Records and handles Freedom of Information requests that pertain to our Town government. The Town Clerk serves as the Clerk of the Town Board and prepares the minutes of the meetings, which can be accessed by the public on our website. Our Office also collects the Town and County taxes and sends tax receipts to property owners. Notary service is also offered free of charge during regular business hours. Our office hours are Monday 8AM-4PM and 6PM-8PM, Tuesday through Thursday 8AM-4PM, Friday 8AM-1PM.

TOWN HISTORIAN

The Scottsville Free Library Building

The most recognizable landmark in the Town of Wheatland is the library building at 28 Main Street in Scottsville. Although the building has been known as a library for many years, it was not built for that purpose. In the late 1800's the people of Scottsville needed a meeting place and concert hall, and through the efforts of a group of prominent men plans were made to build a magnificent facility.

The new building was designed by Rochester architect Charles Ellis in the popular Queen Ann style of the day. Local carpenter Myron Pope was the builder. "Windom Hall" was chosen as the name, and on February 14, 1891 a grand opening was held which included a supper, a ball, and the staging of the drama "Above the Clouds." Amenities in the hall included a large stage framed by elaborate curtains and trap doors in the floor to accommodate disappearing acts. A large balcony brought the total capacity to over 500 seats. For over 30 years Windom Hall was the venue for plays, concerts, dances, high school graduations, and meetings of all kinds.


A group of citizens called the "Scottsville Improvement Society" purchased Windom Hall in 1915 and opened a library and reading room in one part of the building. The following year the Scottsville Free Library received its charter from New York State. After the new Scottsville High School was built in 1927, an auditorium was available there for community events, and the use of Windom Hall diminished. Meanwhile, the library had been growing and improving, so that in 1937 it expanded into the main floor of the building.

In 1947 local philanthropist R. T. Miller Jr. donated chimes to be played in the evening from the library tower to honor those who had served in the armed forces during war times. A roster of their names is beautifully engraved in the library's north wall, which was designed by Carl F. Schmidt, a local architect and historian.

The Scottsville Library building was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1994. It shines as a unique and handsome landmark, but even more brightly because of over 130 years of service to the community as a cultural gathering place.

CHS Mobile Integrated Health Care

CHS Mobile Integrated Health Care is the ambulance service covering Wheatland, Henrietta, Scottsville, Chili, Mumford, York and Caledonia. Created from a combination of local Emergency Medical Services, CHS now responds to over 14,000 calls a year with 11 ambulances and 4 EMS response cars. We have over 100 highly trained employees and volunteers available 24/7/365 to respond to these emergencies. In addition to responding to calls for service, CHS offers many services to the community. These include:


- Free CPR and First Aid Training
- A loan closet that allows us to temporarily provide walkers, crutches and wheelchairs
- Emergency Medical Standbys for large events including festivals and concerts
- Blood pressure screening

Calling 911 can be a stressful event. Small actions can make a great difference in the Emergency Medical Services response. When calling 911, it's important to answer all questions the call taker asks. While this can feel like it is delaying the response, EMS are often started while these questions are being asked. Actions to prepare for EMS arrival include putting any pets away in a separate room, turning on a porch light to illuminate your house number, and preparing a list of your medications.

While you should always call 911 if you need an ambulance, we are happy to answer any questions about Emergency Medical Services in your community. Our on-duty dispatchers, reached by calling (585) 334-4190 can direct your questions.

Scottsville Fire Department

Mumford Fire District

The Mumford Firemen's Museum is home to an impressive collection of firefighting history, featuring artifacts not only from the Mumford Fire Department but also from departments around the area.

The museum itself carries a unique story. It was built by volunteer firefighters using many materials salvaged from the original firehouse during its renovation. First opened in October 2008, it closed for a short time before being proudly reopened by the Mumford Fire Department. Since then, visitors from around the world have come to explore its rich history. Among the highlights is the original fire bell, acquired shortly after the department's incorporation in 1876. This bell has remained in Mumford ever since, making it a particularly meaningful part of the collection. Other notable pieces include an 1892 Gleason Bailey two-wheel "jump cart" and a four-wheel hand pumper, which replaced the traditional bucket brigade system. The collection also features a two-wheel hose cart purchased in 1896 for a steel plant near Lancaster, NY, and a two-wheel hand pumper first put into service in 1861 in Chorg-Ju, Korea.

Beyond equipment, the museum houses a solemn 9/11 memorial exhibit, honoring the lives lost that day, including the 343 firefighters who made the ultimate sacrifice.

The museum is open seasonally, from May through October, in conjunction with the fire department's chicken barbecues. Hours are Sundays from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., weather permitting. If the doors are open, we invite you to step inside and take a walk through firefighting history.



HIGH SPEED INTERNET

Residents in the most rural parts of the Town will recall when DSL internet was introduced, replacing the older dial-up service. However, DSL proved to be a slow and unreliable option, serving as the primary internet service for nearly two decades for many rural households. A group of dedicated residents later advocated for the necessity of high-speed internet in the underserved areas of Wheatland, taking their concerns to local, county, and state officials.

In January of 2023, Monroe County announced the “Community Access Plan and Funding Strategy for Broadband,” outlining how the County would spend \$20 million in ARPA funding it had allocated for this initiative. In October of that year, the final plan, a component of the County’s “Bring Monroe Back” initiative, was released, which highlighted the actual areas of the County – approximately 240 homes with nearly half in Wheatland – that would be upgraded to high-speed broadband service.

Earlier in 2025, Spectrum began the installation of fiber optic cable within the Town. As a result of this effort, approximately 115 homes in the Town of Wheatland now have high-speed broadband services.

The impact is already being felt:

“Having broadband has finally brought our side of town into the 21st century. The switch in service was very easy once our house was hooked up. We’re saving over \$200 a month between our phones, WiFi, and streaming services. My daughter’s house got WiFi for the very first time – imagine having school-age children during COVID without access to WiFi! Plus, since COVID, nearly everything is online. We are all very grateful for getting Spectrum installed.” – Maureen Leupold, Oatka Creek Road

This project is a great example of government at its very best - residents presenting their needs, and governmental officials at all levels working across the aisle to find the funding to make things happen. From homework and telehealth visits to saving money on monthly bills, Wheatland families are seeing the difference broadband makes. With the build-out complete as of August 2025, our community now has the same access as our larger neighbors, setting Wheatland up for growth, opportunity, and connection well into the future.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The Highway Department has recently welcomed new team members to fill the following positions:

- **Adam Baldeck - Mechanic**
- **Jakob DeSalvo - Laborer**
- **Kyle Johnson - Heavy Equipment Operator**

With these new hires, the Highway Department has achieved full employment status. Additionally, the department has acquired a 10-wheel dump truck (used for material transport and plowing), and a new pickup truck. The Department plans to purchase a 6-wheeler (same usage) in 2025 as well. These purchases are made through budget allocation and Capital Reserves.

The department has been actively assisting neighboring towns with their roadwork projects, which include:

- **Mendon** - Boughton Hill Road, Plains Road, and Williams Road
- **Riga** - Bovee Road, Brew Road, Chili Avenue extension, Johnson Road, Palmer Road, Robertson Road, and Sheridan Road
- **Rush** - East River Road

These projects are important and generate Town Highway revenue and are undertaken with caution to avoid straining our own Town projects and regular business operations. Closer to home, the following projects have been completed or are currently in progress:

- **Village of Scottsville** - Browns Avenue, Diana Drive, and Heather Lane
- **Town of Wheatland** - Armstrong Road, Belcoda Road, Beulah Road, Cedars Road, and Lime Rock Road
